#### Why are we talking about this?

11th February was the International Day of Women and Girls in Science

#### **DISCUSSION:**

What are the arguments for and against?

#### **Pros/Arguments for:**

The more diverse a workforce, the better for the companies and industries due to a wider talent pool.

Since the pandemic, more students have been choosing science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) subjects at university. We've seen a lot more scientists on our screens, so maybe it's no surprise that 59% of young people are more tempted by careers in science than they were before COVID. But when it comes to those who study or work in STEM there is a huge gender gap.

#### **Cons/Arguments Against:**

David Grossman explores the 'gender-equality paradox' proposed in a new study which suggests that more gender-equal countries have fewer women pursuing careers in the fields of science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

There should be a focus on gender equality in ALL fields such as construction, childcare, finance, etc.

#### NOVA MUSICIANS HEAD TO LONDON

A group of Nova music scholars were privileged to take part in the Modulo Orchestra project at Cecil Sharp House, London. With so many restrictions around access to music-making in the last two-years, the Modulo Programme is a compelling addition to our enrichment offer, enabling scholars to enhance their musical skills, play an instrument as part of a large-scale ensemble and forge new friendships, while also developing their aptitude for teamwork, communication skills and resilience.

During the trip scholars connected with young people from other schools across the region to rehearse the music as a large-scale orchestra, worked on a creative cross-arts project, and met a whole host of artists and musicians from the arts world. In July, every Modulo school in the UK will gather at the Royal Academy of Music to create an incredible national ensemble of inspiring young musicians. The trip was a fantastic opportunity for every scholar involved and they all found it incredibly rewarding.




#### **VISITS TO SCHOOL**

#### **STUDENT ACHIEVEMENTS**

#### We are proud of...

Year 10 scholar Oriol (Pegasus House) who was invited to take part in a pre-Olympic Judo training camp in Paris. The training took place at the venue for the 2024 Olympics and with the host nation coaching team. Oriol was one of just seven elite GB players to be invited, and the only 14 year old to attend the camp.

Oriol already competes at international level and he was selected for the Paris training by an international judo scout when he attended a training camp in Croatia at half term.

The following weekend, he went on to compete at the British Schools Judo Championships, with other Year 10 and 11 boys in the under 73kg category. He fought very hard and achieved his best ever result as a cadet.

We're all very impressed by Oriol's hard work and dedication and we're following his progress with pride.

"Students in France study judo in school, so they get funding for the sport which means there are some very good fighters in France - they're usually in the top 3 in the world. The training was very intensive, with three or four sessions each day over the three days, and visits to national centres for training. It was a great development opportunity for me and a fantastic experience."
