100,000 STEPS AGAINST DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

During lockdown, RE teacher Miss Owen has raised over £650 for Swindon Domestic Abuse Support by walking 100,000 steps in just one day.

Miss Owen had signed up for a variety of fundraising events this summer which were all cancelled due to COVID-19. She enjoys challenging herself physically and ran her first half marathon for MIND in September. When the government relaxed the social distancing rules, she challenged herself to walk 100,000 steps, which she predicted would be equivalent to 45 miles.

Here's her diary for the day:



- 4:30am a two hour walk along St Andrews Ridge we tried to watch the sunrise but it was too cloudy! I did this part with my fiancé (Simon) and my dog (Blue).
- 6.30am after dropping off Simon and Blue off at home, I headed straight back out, walking around Shaw Country Park where I spotted a baby deer!
- 9am a 3½ hour walk into town, around Old Town, and along the old railway track.
- 2pm a lunchbreak at home was followed by another 3½ hours walk to Purton, through Mouldon Hill. At this point, I got lost exploring some fields and started to panic as my phone battery was starting to get low.
- 6.20pm walked to Tadpole Village. This is where it started getting tough. I was sunburnt, sore, and tired and still felt I had loads left to do.
- 8.50pm I picked up Simon and Blue and walked along the cycle path round the back of Nova Hreod Academy, where we saw more deer!
- 11.20pm The sun was setting, it was gorgeous and nobody was about. I was exhausted, limping, but I finally did it!

One of the first competitions for students during lockdown was the Creative Writing Competition. We received some fantastic entries, including this letter that was written by Darcy.

Dear Children of the future,

It is March 2020 and my name is Darcy. I am nearly 15 years old and I live in a "boring" place called Swindon. It's a place where you would think nothing exciting or life changing would happen. I guess I got that wrong, didn't I.

We had heard on the news, social media and radio, that there was a new virus called Covid 19, it had originated in China and that it had spread to other countries across the world. My friends and I didn't really worry about it much. In fact we all laughed and joked about it. It wasn't like it was going to affect us, was it? There had been previous viruses before such as Avian flu and SARS and they hadn't affected us, so why should this Covid19?

How wrong we were.

Things started to change slowly. They started off as little things. We were now being told to wash our hands more often and thoroughly. Then the news started reporting about all the people across the world who had died or were dying of it. Countries started shutting their borders and going into lockdown. People were stranded in countries that were not their homelands and they didn't know if or when they could return to England. The news started calling it a pandemic. This virus had now taken over the whole of the world.

Suddenly things started changing for us as children too. We were now being sent home from school if we had a temperature or a cough. Then our parents were notified that the schools would be closed to all of the pupils with the exception of key workers' children. We had to learn social distancing. Adults the world over started panic buying food and toilet rolls. There were videos all over the media, showing people fighting over a toilet roll. It was madness - the world was going mad!

The Prime Minister went on the news and declared a lockdown. Everyone apart from the NHS and key workers was to stay home. We had to stay in our own houses and only leave to get shopping, walk our dogs or go for exercise. Overnight busy roads, streets and parks became eerily empty. Gone were the children laughing and playing in the streets. No more meeting our friends at the park or going into town. No more seeing them at school because we were all now being home-schooled. Our only contacts now were video chats on Whatsapp and Facetime but it wasn't the same was it? More and more people were dying every day. In England alone there had been over 20,000 people who had died. That was enough to fill the whole of the O2 stadium. My gran said the last time things were this bad, it was because of one of the world wars, though I could't remember which one. My mum said it was like the plague or black death but, as I said to her, the Great Fire of London sorted that out and it wasn't like we could set the world on fire to kill the Covid19, was it?

Then suddenly out of all this craziness, we started hearing about the selflessness of people, all working together to help each other. The key workers risked theirs and their families' lives by going above and beyond their job descriptions. Teachers and support staff were going to work on rotas, so that the key workers' children could go to school while their parents worked, as well as planning work for those of us at home. Loads of funny videos and messages from stars started to appear online to cheer us all up. Then, instead of fighting over food and toilet roll, people started getting food for others who were vulnerable and leaving it on their doorsteps. Every Thursday at 8pm we opened our front doors and clapped for the NHS and key workers. It was just to say we knew what they had done and continued to do for us.

I didn't know how much longer it would be until we could get back to our normal, everyday "boring" lives but one thing I did know was that I couldn't wait.


So, children of the future, there really is only this left for me to say.





All entries received 5 praise points, with the winner receiving 20 praise points and an art materials pack.






