### **ALTERNATIVE ANGELS DONATION**

DISC Points are awarded to Nova scholars when they demonstrate the school values of Drive, Integrity, Scholarship and Contribution, which they can convert into gifts from the Epraise shop or donate to charity.

Our generous students have donated over £800 to their chosen charities: Help for Heroes, CALM (Children's Cancer and Leukaemia Movement – Swindon), Diabetes UK and Alternative Angels.

Year 8 student Charlie proudly presented the donation to Jane from Alternative Angels with Mr Foster. She told us how much they depend on the support from the Swindon community and how grateful they are to our scholars for their kind generosity. This week alone, Alternative Angels provided hot meals for 57 rough sleepers and vulnerable people, and we are very proud of our students for choosing to make these donations to charity.



#### STUDENT MESSENGERS

Each day, two scholars work together in the school office to undertake a variety of duties. These Student Messengers are given the chance to gain some valuable experience behind the scenes here at Nova which helps develop their confidence, independence, written and verbal communication skills, and supports their organisational skills. They take on responsibility for recording and passing on messages and work with staff to carry out a range of general duties in the office. Scholars are awarded house points and are given feedback at the end of their day. This experience is enjoyed by many scholars and most ask if they can do it again.



### **NOVA HREOD ACADEMY PUPILS SHINE IN VIRTUAL GREEN LOVE!**

Scholars at Nova Hreod Academy joined together virtually with thousands of their peers from across United Learning to watch themselves in the online premiere of Green Love! Songs to save the world.

Green Love! is an ambitious music and performing arts project designed to develop pupils' musical talents and encourage them to think more about the environment and how, together, we can protect it. The project culminated in the professional production of a unique thirty-minute film, featuring performances recorded in the 40 schools involved.

Last academic year, pupils at Nova Hreod Academy immersed themselves in the world of music and dance, enjoying in-school rehearsals and virtual, group-wide Green Love! assemblies delivered by The Voices Foundation and Beat Goes On. Collectively, they learnt six original songs inspired by sustainability and composed by celebrated musicians Alexander L'Estrange and Joanna Forbes L'Estrange, as well as accompanying body percussion rhythms. Having mastered the lyrics and foottapping rhythms, pupils recorded their final in-school performance in the Summer Term.

To celebrate their hard work, pupils enjoyed an early premiere of Green Love! on Friday afternoon. This was followed by a ticketed online showing in the evening, where pupils' friends and families were able to watch the special performance, held in support of Ibba Girls' School in South Sudan. 



This initiative is said to not only help to develop the pupils' leadership skills, but also to help to develop their moral responsibility.


