The Intentions of the Art and Photography Curriculum

Art is the purest expression of human emotion. Art can help us to understand and have an impact on the world we live in. Art can positively affect student wellbeing and empower individuals, enabling them to engage with our rich visual and cultural heritage. It allows them to express themselves and become visually literate and perceptive.

Art and Photography at Nova will engage, inspire and challenge pupils, equipping them with the knowledge and skills to experiment, invent and create their own works of art, craft and design. As pupils progress year on year, they should be able to think critically and develop a more rigorous understanding of art and design. They will develop fluency in the formal elements of drawing and painting and will progress to apply their basic skills and knowledge into their own projects at KS4. This will prepare students to better understand the world, to study subject in post-16 qualifications, go on to university to study subject and supply knowledge and skills useful in work and appreciation of culture.

There are three key strands to Art at Nova:

<u>Skills development</u> - Students are exposed to a wide variety of materials, starting with a strong foundation in drawing and painting and progressing onto further media to build their confidence and skills incrementally. This will ensure that all pupils: produce creative work, exploring their ideas and recording their experiences to become proficient in a range of materials.

<u>Knowledge</u> – Students will learn the core formal elements of Art and Design and will be able to follow the rules before having the freedom to break them. Students will be introduced to a number of artists and will be able to analyse work by artists, craft makers and designers, and understand the historical and cultural development of their art forms. Students will be able to evaluate and analyse creative works using the language of art.

Exposure to Art – Students will have access to an art library and expert teacher knowledge about a wealth of artists and artworks. In addition to this, students will visit galleries and museums alongside a rich extracurricular offer, such as Art History Club.

The art room is a space where students have the freedom to express their ideas and thoughts and work creatively. Students comment on the bonds they form with classmates because of their shared interests and ideas. The art teacher is someone they can bounce ideas off, whom can help their thoughts and creative ideas become a reality.

Assessing the Impact of our Curriculum in Art and Photography

They are assessed on exploring a range of artists and materials, reviewing and amending work to refine outcomes and strength and quality of outcome.
